This letter is to let you know about registration/weigh-in information for the 2020-2021 4-H year. Due to Covid 19, there will be **no beef weigh-ins** this year.

The **registration deadline** for registering your animals is as follows:

Beef December 11, 2020

Swine: April 9, 2021

Lambs April 23, 2021

The mandatory RFID tags are ordered and will be available at the Extension Office as soon as they arrive (**you will be notified via email, the Facebook page, and website when they are available.**) ***please note the office is closed on Fridays.*

Cost of the beef tags are \$3.50 each

Sheep tags \$2.00 each

Hog tags \$2.00 each

As in the past, you will need to **tag your animals and include a photo** of each animal when registering them.

Official Registration for Barron County Junior Livestock Member Market Steer Sale Eligibility for 2021 Barron County Fair.

Registration must be submitted on or before Friday, December 11th at 11:59 pm. Submit one registration per family. Participants may each register a maximum of three steers. Animals shall not be born prior to January 1st of the year preceding the fair. Animals should be castrated prior to registration. Members will choose the animals they will exhibit at the final weigh-ins of the Barron County Fair. Ear tags can be purchased and picked up from the 4-H Extension Office.

4-H NATIONAL EXPERIENCES

2021 National 4-H Experiences

Due to the uncertainty regarding COVID-19, National 4-H Council, with support and guidance from national Extension leadership, including the 4-H Program Leaders Working Group, has decided that the 2021 National 4-H Educational Experiences will not be held in person. In addition to National 4-H Council's announcement, Wisconsin has made the decision that Space Camp and the American Spirit Experience will not be held in person in 2021. - National 4-H Conference – Virtual
- Space Camp – No Wisconsin Delegation
- American Spirit Experience – Canceled
- 2021 National 4-H Congress – To Be Determined (Does Not Meet at National 4-H Conference Center and is held in November)

The timing of the decision was intended to provide clear direction for county and state programs in the promoting and planning stages and to allow National 4-H Council and their teams time to focus on creating high quality virtual experiences.

Several important factors and considerations guided the decision to move from in-person to virtual: Health and safety of youth, adults, staff and volunteers is a primary concern; Equitable access for all youth at national events; currently 50% of Land Grant Universities have restricted travel and many have indicated continued restrictions through Summer of 2021; Challenge of retrofitting the National 4-H Conference Center to meet social distancing requirements; Opportunity to invest in virtual capabilities and leverage innovation from Extension and youth.

4-H MEETING INFORMATION

Meeting Information:

Don't forget that any in-person events/gatherings still need approval by the State Office. At this time, clubs and groups can meet with 10 or less people if in the same room/small area. Clubs/groups can also meet in "pods". This means that you can have groups of 10 or less meet in a location outdoors if more than 20 feet can be maintained between each pod with a maximum of 5 total pods. You could also have pods indoors if there are separate rooms for each pod. Please contact me and I will help you fill out the proper forms. 4-H Projects

4-H engages youth in **project-based** education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their **interests** and **passions**, ultimately **mastering** new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be **hands-on** to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a **project**?

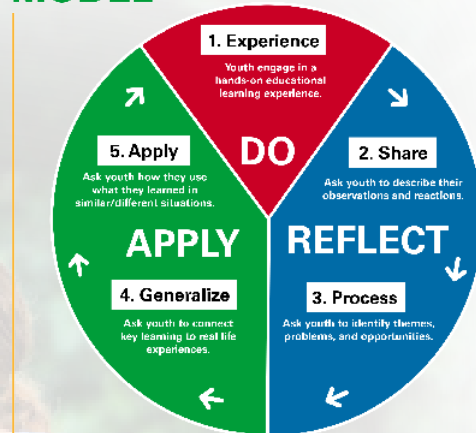
A project is simply a topic area that **sparks** a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:

- Animal Sciences
- Arts & Communication
- Community Involvement
- Cultural Projects
- Family, Home, & Health
- Outdoor Education (Natural Sciences)
- Plant & Soil Sciences
- STEM
- Start Your Own

A tenth project area is specifically for grades K-2, known as **Cloverbuds**. It is intended to be more developmentally appropriate for our youngest members.

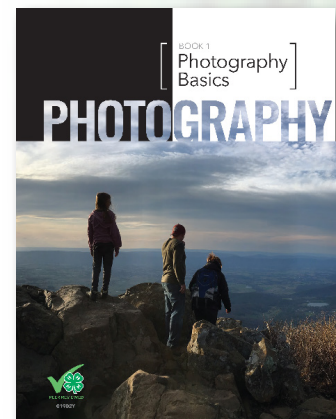

What **resources** are available?

Each county's 4-H program differs in how project learning opportunities are offered. Some programs offer countywide, short-term workshops. Others may have countywide programs with set dates and meeting locations. Some 4-H clubs may have adults specifically devoted to certain project areas.

What if my county or club doesn't offer a project?

Anywhere can be a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from shop4-h.org or your local Extension office.



What is a **project leader**?

Project leaders provide a safe environment to learn about a project area in which they have experience. Adults can volunteer as a project leader to share their specialized skill set with youth!

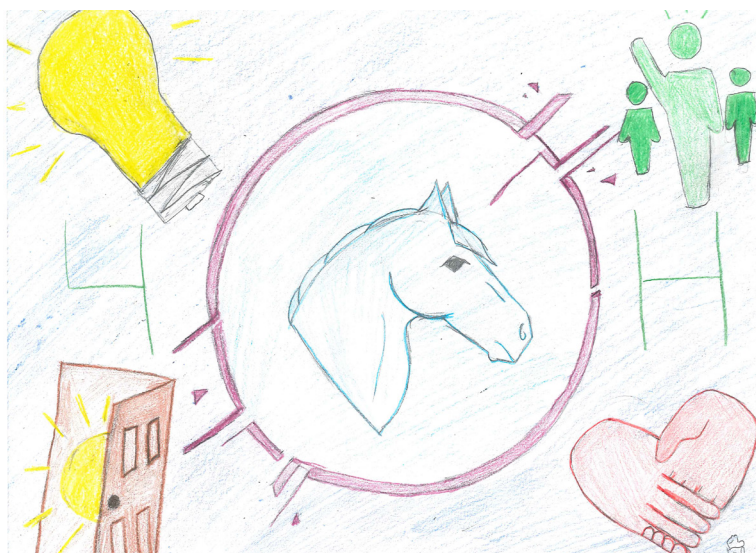

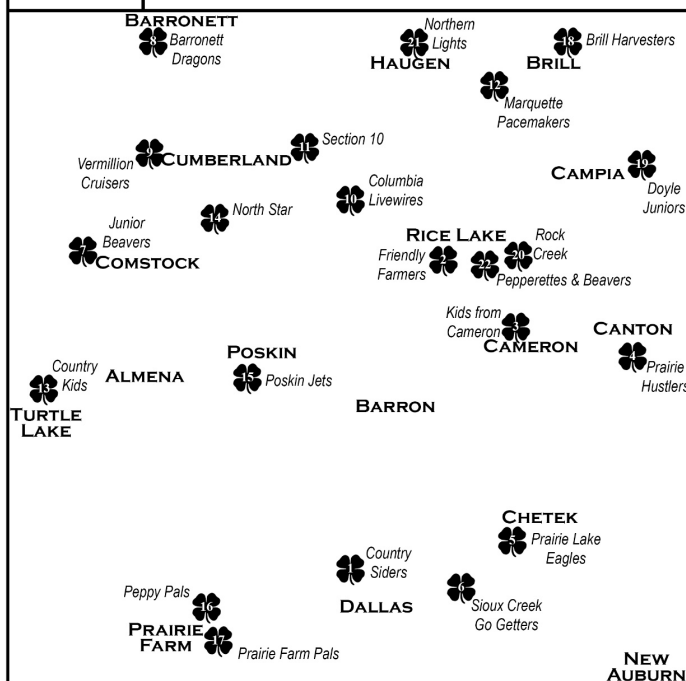
